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Course Description and Learning Objectives

This course is designed as a introduction to women and gender studies. We will study how gender is produced through social interaction, as well as

structures social interaction. By the end of this course you should be able to: We intend to create an atmosphere in which you feel <u>safe</u> to speak freely and we will encourage you to critically reflect your "taken for granted" knowledge.

- Show a clear understanding of the influence of gender in history, culture, and contemporary social structure.
- ➤ Use *scientific* concepts to analyze your own observations and experiences.
- ➤ Be a critical questioner of gender who looks beyond naturalizing and dichotomous conceptions of sex and gender
- Say: "This was a darn interesting and fun class"

Course Format

The format of the class is somewhat out of the ordinary:

- 1) This is a bilingual class (English and German). Some of our students are international; some of our guest speakers are too. This is NOT a grammar class; this is a safe space to have fun with English. Don't worry, be happy.
- 2) It is team taught and much of the time we will spend with together with our parallel group.
- 3) It centers on YOU, the students. It will feature lecture inputs, discussion, but eventually heavily rely on group activities and YOUR input. We conceive of students as adult learners who are responsible for their own success. You will get most out of this class if you actively participate in classroom discussions and group work.
- 4) We have visiting speakers to bring community in the classroom. We organized speakers representing an education studies work field as well as cutting edge feminist activists.
- 5) You can go beyond this classroom and present your learning progress and (art) work in a public exhibition and event.

Required Reading

To allow you to learn from a diverse array of global scholars and as a service, a "reading pool" with texts will be provided on Moodle. YOU are this class, and its success relies on your preparation of the materials

Building Blocks - Bausteine:

<u>Group Work:</u> You will create a creative, analytical collage on one of 26 central concepts of gender theory and contemprary gender and sexualities issues. You will pick your concept in the first class and find group

members in a "lottery" system. The collage will be ort of an acadmic poster, we ask you to be creative though and provide visual and 3D elements, as you will participate in a public exhibition with your work (on voluntary basis).

<u>Oral exam, June 14 2016:</u> The exam will be held in small groups and you will receive your exact exact time in due time. The exam is based on four questions pertaining to your collage, pertaining to the complete texts to the glossary of 26 concepts the class will elaborate and open questions to guest speakers and lectures in the class.
